Most Plastic Food & Beverage Containers

NO dishes or cookware

NO ceramics or pottery

NO aerosol cans

NO scrap metal

NO light bulbs

NO batteries

NO window glass or mirrors

empty, rinse, flatten, put caps or lids back on if you can no B or B plastics



Glass Bottles & Jars

rinse clean, remove caps and lids pop and beer boxes, too!



Milk Cartons & Juice Boxes

remove caps and lids, rinse clean, flatten





rinse clean. labels are OK



Clothes & Linens

NO paper towel or toilet paper tubes

NO paper cups, plates, or napkins

NO tissue or wrapping paper

NO refrigerated or frozen food boxes

None of the plastics on this list

NO egg cartons or egg carton-type material

We can take reusable, worn & torn items. or rags. Items must be clean and dry.

Please make sure items are in a VERY sturdy plastic bag and fastened tightly!

Clearly label the bag CLOTHES & LINENS and place it next to your bin.

SIMPLE GUIDELIMES FOR PLASTICS RECYCLING:

As a general rule, most food and beverage **containers** are recyclable

(and some containers from your bathroom and laundry room, too).



(soda, juice, water, shampoo,

laundry & dish soap)



Produce Containers (lettuce, berries, etc.)



Yogurt, Cottage Cheese & Butter Containers

Beware of 3 & 6!

Transparent Deli "To-go" Containers

These plastic items are **not** recyclable.

However, just because it's on the "no" list doesn't mean it needs to be trash! Call us for ideas!



- NO bottles used for home needle disposal
- NO 🚳 or 🚳 plastic
- NO foam egg cartons or Styrofoam™
- NO disposable cups, plates, or utensils
- NO bulky items such as lawn furniture, kiddy pools, etc.
- NO toys
- NO plastic bags or film (call for other recycling options)
- NO containers that held hazardous materials
- NO containers larger than 3 gallons
- NO packaging from toys and electronics
- NO plant or landscaping pots
- . NO black plastic, including microwave food trays
- NO compostable materials (often marked with a 🐴)

SINGLE-SORT RECYCLING:

Starting the **week of April 7**, you can put all of your recyclables together in your bins.



Does single-sort recycling really work?

All programs in the metro area (and many throughout the nation) are moving toward single-sort recycling, but there are still concerns that mixing all materials together results in fewer of them getting recycled. This has been (and still is) true of some single-sort programs, but we intend to try to resolve the problems and will share the results. What better way to explore these problems and find solutions than to do it ourselves!

Eureka Recycling invested in the people and technology needed to make sure we recycle as much as possible. You can do your part by being careful to put only recyclable materials – especially plastics – in your bin (carts coming next year)! While this certainly won't be the first single-sort program in the country, together we will make it one of the best!

Also starting the week of April 7, you can recycle many more food and beverage containers and know they will really get made into new products! See inside for more details.

Is collecting more plastic really a good thing?

Yes! By collecting more plastics for recycling, we keep them out of incinerators and landfills and ensure they have another life, saving energy and resources.
